COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is offered by the School of Social and Communication Sciences and aims to provide students with an introduction to the Basque land, people and culture. A familiarity and understanding of the local setting is especially important in a degree related to the social sciences, and thus this course offers students a basic understanding of the society which hosts the degrees on media, communication and politics of this University. The course does not complement any specific course of the School of Social and Communication Sciences, but it can be used to acquire a background before enrolling in courses with a focus on local media, institutions or society. The course is aimed at visitor students. Local students who are interested in working on the use of Basque for academic purposes are strongly advised to enroll in other courses offered by the Department of Basque Language and Communication and which are aimed at Basque students.

COMPETENCES/LEARNING RESULTS FOR THE SUBJECT

- Critically discussing opinions and views on Basque language and culture
- Becoming familiar with the main features of the Basque language, land and culture
- Recognizing a variety of signs of Basque identity (speech, attitude, activities...)
- Locating a given cultural product in time and space: texts, songs, buildings, etc.

TEACHING METHODS

A number of reading materials will serve as the starting point for each topic of the course. Home readings will be recommended and students will be expected to actively participate in class-discussions on the topics introduced by means of various texts, charts and audiovisual media. A number of activities will be suggested with the objective of reinforcing the acquired information and familiarizing students with new examples and cases that are relevant for each topic.

All the course activities wil be in English, including the exams, as will be the main materials for reference and study. Students will therefore be expected to communicate in English with reasonable clarity and fluency, both orally and in writing.

This course-guide provides a framework for the course's organization and evaluation system. The actual and specific implementation of these guidelines will be reflected in the Student's Guide which the course instructor will provide at the first class meeting.

ORDINARY EXAMINATION PERIOD: GUIDELINES & OPTING OUT

Students can choose one of two evaluation systems: an exam-only system, where their grade will be based entirely on a final exam, or a combined evaluation system based on their coursework plus the grade they obtain in a final exam. In the combined system, the final grade will be the result of adding up the partial grades from a number of activities and assignments (up to a 30% of the total grade) to the grade they obtain in the final exam (will be worth at least 70% of the grade). A student can choose to do all, some or none of the class-activities and assignments. The value of the activities that the student decides not to perform will be available in the final exam (for instance, for a student who collects a 20% of the coursework points by means of his/her independent work his/her final exam will be worth 80% of the total grade).

1st option: course activities (30%) + final exam (70%). Value of course activities and assignments:

30% - Contributions to the course resources (basically, creating visual learning material which can help fellow students to gain a better understanding of any topic not covered in deep in the course).

2nd option: Final exam. Students can choose to have their grade based solely on the final exam (total maximum value: 100%).

The exam will be composed of a number of questions (around 20, to answer in 4-6 lines) on the topics presented and discussed in the course or some space to comment on the cultural significance of a number of objects (texts, places, songs...). If online evaluation were necessary due to health measures or other, the exam format would be more essay-like

Renouncing an examination: failure to attend the exam will be understood as a renounce, and thus this examination will not be counted in the student's records.

EXTRAORDINARY EXAMINATION PERIOD: GUIDELINES & OPTING OUT

A new final exam will be offered in the second examination period. The points earned by a student through the class-activities will count for this examination, unless it is wished otherwise. For students with no points earned, the final exam will be worth 100% of the grade. No new points can be earned through assignments or class activities after the first examination.
