

THE ARM OF LIBERTY



The Statue of Liberty is probably the most famous icon of the USA. It was built to celebrate the end of slavery, and later became a symbol for freedom among immigrants. The statue depicts Libertas, the Roman goddess of liberty. And the torch she carries high above her arm represents a light that guides people along the path to freedom. This statue is not only the tallest statue in America, but it is also one of the most recognizable American symbols.

The statue was a gift from France to the United States, given in 1886 to celebrate the friendship between the two countries. The idea for the statue came from a French poet, Édouard de Laboulaye. When the American Civil war ended, he wanted to commemorate the end of the slave trade with a gift. He and other people who opposed slavery raised money and hired a sculptor, Frédéric-Auguste Bartholdi, to design the statue. The statue's internal structure was designed by the famous engineer Gustave Eiffel, who is also known for designing the Eiffel Tower. Together, Bartholdi and Eiffel ensured the statue was both beautiful and structurally strong.

The statue shows a woman holding a torch in her right hand and a book in her left hand. The torch represents light and hope, and the book has the date "July 4, 1776," the day the United States declared its independence.

Visitors can take a ferry to Liberty Island to see the statue up close. There is also a museum where people can learn about the history and construction of the statue.
